

Profiling species at risk

St. Anthony Airport is one of several airports in the province with a 'species at risk' display. The initiative, launched by Environment Canada's Canadian Wildlife Service, is in an effort to educate people about the species in the province that are at risk, and provide information on what people can do as individuals to help make a difference. Species that will be displayed at the airports include: Barrens Willow, Barrow's Goldeneye, Boreal Felt Lichen, Fernald's Braya, Fernald's Milk-vetch, Long's Braya, Porsild's Bryum, Woodland Caribou, Wolverine, Harlequin Duck, Ivory Gull, Newfoundland Marten, Peregrine Falcon, Piping Plover, Polar Bear, Red Crossbill, Rusty Blackbird, and the Shorteared Owl. Assisting with the project was the Department of Environment and Conservation. The display was set up by Dulcie House (left), co-ordinator of the Limestone Barrens Habitat Stewardship Project and Paul Harris, a habitat and species technician with the Canadian Wildlife Service.
